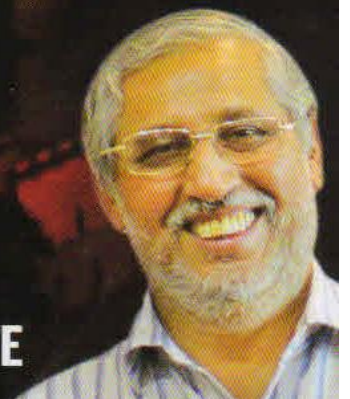

Mushrooming of colleges: Quality versus Quantity

The natural law of demand and supply has led to the consolidation of the engineering education and has separated the wheat from the chaff. The colleges most affected are those which had mushroomed with the exclusive purpose of cashing in on the demand for technical education. Most of these institutions were merely degree granting institutions producing engineering graduates rather than engineers. They lacked proper buildings, equipment and qualified teachers. In Tamil Nadu, in 2016, over a lakh seats remained vacant and over a 100 colleges applied for closure across the country.

This is also a unique opportunity for the regulators to rid the sector of its ills and promote quality education institutions backed by visionary founders in engineering education. The requirements to set up engineering colleges should be made stricter to discourage the 'fair weather' operators looking for quick profits. Also there should be stringent regular checks for all existing colleges. Institutions which have earned a reputation for quality education and exhibited social responsibility should be encouraged by offering autonomy or University status. □
